





Saint-Lazare councillor expelled from council for two weeks

Alleged conflict of interest regarding blood drive



Saint-Lazare District 5 Councillor Richard Chartrand said his commercial establishment, Bar Chez-Mauice, does not profit financially from the annual blood drive held on its premises and says the goal is to help save lives.

Saint-Lazare District 5 Councillor Richard Chartrand was at the Tuesday evening council meeting as usual but not in his role as councillor. Chartrand was sitting in the audience as an ordinary citizen after being expelled from council for a two-week period based on a reported conflict of interest ruling that was recently handed down by the Commission municipale du Québec (CMQ).

The decision by the CMQ stems from a blood drive that was held by Chartrand for Héma-Québec at his private enterprise, bar Chez Maurice, in 2019. The CMQ ruled that, as a councillor, Chartrand was in a conflictof-interest because the town was not obliged to put up signs or promote the blood drive in any way.

Meant to help those in need

Chartrand maintains the blood drive, one of several he's held over the past few years, was not intended to solicit any kind of financial gain from the town or anyone else, but merely to collect blood to help those in need. "Last year I voted for the city's blood donor clinic and I was in a conflict of interest because I held my blood donor clinic after that," he said.

"The CMQ ruled that because I had my blood donor clinic at Chez Maurice, I was doing marketing for my business and I'm in a conflict of interest because I'm using the city to make money which isn't the case. I just want to save lives," Chartrand told The Journal. He added the CMQ's decision to expel him from council was unfair.

Council's reaction


District 1 Councillor Geneviève Lachance said it was unfortunate the situation reached the point where Chartrand was expelled especially considering all the positive work the Chartrand family has done to help the community with their previous blood drives. She added the expulsion puts a stain on the Chartrand family name.

District 2 Councillor Pierre Casavant said while he didn't know all the specifics related to the issue because he was recently elected to council in a by-election, he personally felt the two week expulsion was a bit too much.

District 4 Councillor Michel Poitras said it was unfortunate the situation caused a whirlpool within a small glass. District 6 Councillor Brain Trainor was also supportive of Chartrand. "I think there was no malintent on what you did. You've done wonderful things for the past 20 years with the blood donor clinic. There was never any intention on your behalf to do anything wrong," said Trainor.

"From a layman's point-of-view, no one would see you as having done anything wrong but from a technical point-of-view it's deemed you did cross the line as far as what the CMQ claim as being in a conflict-of-interest," Trainor added.

Mayor Robert Grimaudo declined to comment specifically on Chartrand's situation except to say that, "The CMQ did their investigation and issued their





Wheels of justice

When the SQ released security camera footage of an Île-Perrot hit-and-run collision almost a year ago seeking information from the public, it immediately went viral. The video showed a pedestrian crossing the street one snowy evening before being flung into the air like a rag doll after being struck by a dark SUV. The driver continued on his way without stopping (see story on

We recently found out the driver will not serve any jail time even though he operated a motor vehicle for eight months despite doctor's orders not to do so due to an eye problem. And it's reasonable to draw the conclusion that a lack of proper vision would aggravate the situation on what was a dark and snowy evening. The Crown Prosecutor herself thought jail time was warranted for a visual impairment severe enough that the offender later said he assumed he had hit the curb with his car, and not

The sentence decided by the judge was similar to that of the penalty issued for a first-offense of drunk driving. Not to condone driving under the influence in any way, but the choice to drive drunk is most often a one-time lapse in judgment and drunkenness is rarely if ever - a condition that endures for eight months.

The fact that the victim was not killed should in no way lessen the consequences for the decision the driver made to put the lives of his fellow community members repeatedly at risk.

Fair share Dear Editor,

I have been the general manager of Manoir Cavagnal since February, 1998. For those who are new to Hudson it was built in 1978 and owned by five Legions. We are not-for-profit and our purpose is to give veterans, their families, and moderate to lower income seniors an affordable place

Being able to live in beautiful Hudson, walking distance to all services and amenities, in a nice apartment in a well-maintained building at a low rent was, of course, the goal of those dedicated veterans who got this project running.

Our building is now 42 years old and the challenges to keep this vision and promise alive is getting more difficult as repairs become more expensive, utilities, materials, manpower, taxes, and everything goes up in price.

Our rents include heating, electricity, hot water and Videotron cable television. Our 3 1/2 apartments are \$707 per month. We have managed to keep the rents low thanks to prudent budgeting, wonderful volunteers (tenants and outsiders), and dedicated staff who have no problem going beyond their duties or paid hours.

For the last three years I have been asking council members to revisit our taxation regarding

We are taxed as residential; therefore our rate for water and sewer is the same as a house (any size, any number of bedrooms, bathroom or inhabitants) times 88 apartments (doors). For example last year we paid \$64,525.42 in taxes of which \$27,434.88 was only for water and sewer.

Anyone would agree that one small apartment with mainly one senior living there does not use either services in the same amount as a house. We have a water meter (since March, 2011) and are able to track consumption and we use approximately 30 per cent of what Quebec measures per household.

I have been asking for the last three years that those two services be reduced to one charge for every two apartments (44). I believe it's more than fair. Council has been promising to look into it. Again this year I have sent all the most recent information and yet it falls on deaf ears.

To make matters even worse 2020 taxation shows an increase of sewer tax from \$172.42 per door to \$250 giving the Manoir a direct hit of \$6,800. Just on that one service.

Our founders would be very disappointed. I am very disappointed that this council has so little understanding that not every pensioner can afford huge rents - many receive Federal and Provincial pension only. The Manoir Cavagnal's residents occupy a huge place in Hudson. They shop locally, frequent local restaurants, and at-

If you agree that our tenants should pay for what they use and not be bundled with all the homes in Hudson, maybe to can reach out to your councillor and explain them what fairness

No jail for Île-Perrot hit-and-run driver

île-Perrot resident Eric Flynn, found guilty of operating a conveyance in a manner that is dangerous to the public following a hit-and-run incident on January 29 of last year, received a sentence of 100 hours of community service and two years of probation.

Crown prosecutor Cynthia Perreault requested that Flynn receive a sentence of three to six months in prison, given that he struck the victim when he had been explicitly told by his doctor not to drive, and that he failed to remain at the scene or report the incident to police afterwards.

Flynn is a former first responder with the Town of Île-Perrot who went on long-term disability because of an eye condition, diagnosed in May of 2018, for which he is awaiting surgery. He admitted at the Valleyfield Courthouse on December 6, 2019 that he had continued to drive "short distances" on a daily basis for roughly eight months between the time he was told to stop driving and when he struck the victim, 40-year-old Mario Cianfagna. The incident occurred on a snowy evening at the intersection of 25th Avenue and Boulevard Perrot. Flynn testified that he did not see the victim and thought he had driven over a curb.

"Am I wearing glasses?" asked Judge

Bertrand St-Arnaud, in an impromptu test of the severity of Flynn's impairment. Leaning forward in the stand, not more than 15 feet from the judge's bench, Flynn was unable to tell.

Driving with impaired vision

Said Perreault, "He knew clearly this was a real risk. Driving (like this) every day since the spring of 2018, that's how many times he risked lives?" Noting the impact statement of the victim, who suffered injuries from the trauma, Perreault said he was lucky there was a snow bank to catch his fall. She wondered aloud how driving with Flynn's level of vision impairment was any different from driving while impaired by alcohol or drugs.

The incident was captured on video, which widely made the rounds on news and social media and can be seen at www.facebook.com/TheJournalYLJ/videos/2340115966052142. Flynn ad-

mitted that even when his daughter showed him the video, and he recognized himself in it, he did not come forward. He didn't confess his involvement to anyone until Sûreté du Québec (SQ) officers, following their investigation, arrived at his front door. He then allowed them to look at his vehicle, but still did not disclose his eve problems.

Judge opts against prison time

Perrault cited a precedent where a similar offender was sentenced to 12 months in prison, while Flynn's lawyer, Constantin Kyriakidis, cited examples of lesser sentencing and requested an absolute discharge.

The judge dismissed the idea of a discharge, saying that it would send the wrong message about driving when you should not. He noted circumstances he'd seen where accidents had been caused by drivers who got behind the wheel in

spite of exhaustion, or by seniors who continued to drive after symptoms associated with age had made it dangerous. He also, however, said he had an obligation to consider all reasonable alternative sanctions.

Ultimately, citing Flynn's character as a 50-year-old family man with no previous record and a low likelihood to re-offend, St-Arnaud opted not to send him to jail. He instead issued the sentence of community service along with probation, including the condition that Flynn surrender his driver's license and be prohibited from driving for a period of one year.



Roads and tax fairness on the agenda for Hudson

The Town of Hudson held their regular council meeting as scheduled on January 13, and major issues for discussion included a by-law stipulating requirements for the municipalization of private roads, the new residential and commercial tax structures for 2020, and questions about the fairness of the new tax structure for a local seniors' residence.

The meeting was again led by Pro-Mayor Austin Rikley-Krindle, causing citizens to question if Mayor Jamie Nicholls was going to return, and why he is entitled to continue earning a salary while he is absent. Council simply confirmed that by Quebec law elected municipal officials have the right to three months' paid leave if they are unable for any reason to carry out their duties.

During question period, resident Elizabeth Corker rose to ask about the logic of the new by-law stipulating the conditions to municipalize roads. Several roads in Hudson are still privately owned, but the town is continuing to work towards municipalizing them and the by-law sets out the conditions that must first be met by private owners before the town can take responsibility for future re-paving and maintenance.

Said Corker, "Months ago we met with the Director General (Philip Toone) and members of the infrastructure committee to discuss the Quarry Point homeowners' association's proposal to re-pave lower Quarry Point and then turn it over to the town." Corker said they followed specifications provided by public works and requested a letter confirming the ac-

ceptance of the proposal before they would commit to privately paying for roughly \$100,000 of roadwork.

"We never got that letter and are now having to deal with a whole new set of criteria listed in By-law 724. I would have to say that under the new criteria ... it is impossible to conform to and totally cost prohibitive." She followed up saying this takes away any incentive for private road owners to municipalize roads unless there was room for negotiation.

To complicate issues, there are several roads where listed owners are either impossible to find or deceased, in which case the town will have to take on the financial responsibility for municipalization. "So us poor schmucks are the only ones who have to pay?" asked Corker, wondering why private road owners are being held to such a high standard while paying the same taxes as those who live on public roads. Councillor Jim Duff. a member of the infrastructure committee, pointed out an allowance for exceptions in the document and said, "I think we can probably negotiate a solution."

The by-law was passed by majority, with Councillor Helen Kurgansky opposed.

Tax fairness

Rikley-Krindle gave a presentation on the new tax structure for 2020. In the spirit of fairness, mill rates are actually being lowered while fees for debt service, water, sewer, and garbage are being raised to reflect use. The goal is to ensure that no one is taxed for services they do not receive. The presentation showed an average residential tax increase of 1.74 per cent to 2.33 per cent, which the promayor stated is in line with inflation.

provide fairness for most, Nicole Durand, who runs the Manoir Cavagnal seniors' residence, feels that they in particular will suffer under the new model. With 88 units in the residence, "...you are charging me 88 times for sewer and water, and I see here that the rate for sewer is going up to \$250 which gives me a net increase at the Manoir of \$6,820." She argued it is unfair that the residential rate is the same for them, with single seniors living in small apartments, as it is for large family homes with many members including young kids.

"We don't use even a third of the water that other residential properties do," Durand said. She asked, with several residents later voicing support, that the town consider the financial realities of low-income seniors and reduce the tax load to one application of the water and sewer fees for every two doors in the residence instead.

It's all good



When one decade wraps with a viral news story of the holiest of holy men Pope Francis slapping the hand of an over-zealous worshipper, one can be forgiven for thinking it's a harbinger of what's to come and, so far, 2020 has been noteworthy in many truly awful ways.

From the ongoing reports of the devastating wildfires in Australia that have, by some estimates, killed as many as a billion animals, we then received news of the

Trump-ordered retaliatory assassination of Iranian military general Qasem Soleimani. Dozens of mourners were crushed at the revered figure's funeral procession. The ensuing instability in the region saw the downing of a Ukrainian commercial flight resulting in the death of 176 civilians, mostly Iranian and Canadian, reportedly the result of surface to air missiles fired in error.

Harvey Weinstein continues to face new allegations of sexual assault whilst appearing in court on previous charges and the United Kingdom recently sentenced its most prolific rapist - reportedly 190 victims - to life in prison.

I could go on but other stories, like Megxit for example, is not of the same calibre in comparison to what's occurred only two weeks into this New Year.

So I'm grateful to Rigaud reader Sandra Stephenson who sent me a link to remind me that despite climate change, earthquakes, and a royal deciding to move his family out of his mom's house, there is news to celebrate in the world if we look for it.

Over the past 12 months, there have been increases in the population size of humpback whales, dolphins, and tigers while poaching rates for rhinos and elephants have dropped.

More attention is being paid to the globe's oceans and forests via concrete measures including Canada becoming the first country in the world to protect more than 10 per cent of its oceans.

Malaria infections have dropped in Asia by 76 per cent and have been eliminated in Algeria and Argentina, and HIV-related deaths are a third of what they were in 2010.

Cigarette and alcohol consumption is down and the population is kicking cancer's ass with more force than it ever has be-

Ebola, trachoma, typhoid, heart disease, tuberculosis, polio, stroke... all significantly diminished.

Many countries are phasing out, or have already banned, single use plastics, Styrofoam, and microbeads - even balloons by

Of course it's not all good news. While the US senate passed legislation protecting 1.3 million acres from mining operations, it was revealed this week that Trump's wall along the Mexican border will traverse part of the Rio Grande Valley National Wildlife Refuge in Texas, a biologically diverse area that's been protected for four decades.

I also really wanted to believe the news story about the wombats in Australia who were - according to Greenpeace - shepherding other small mammals into their vast complexes of underground burrows to escape the wildfire flames, thereby showing more leadership than many elected officials. Unfortunately, turns out it's not entirely true. Apparently wombats create intricate burrows with metres of tunnels having multiple entrances and other critters have been known to descend into them, sometimes without the wombats' knowledge.

So while they're technically not 'shepherding' other animals into their underground homes, there have been observances of interspecies tolerance in extremis meaning that in recognition of the extreme conditions, the wombats are permitting the presence of other animals in need.

One more lesson us humans can learn from animals.

New Canadian judo champion in Île-Perrot

Sixteen-year-old Myriam Brazeau, who trains with the Dojo Perrot Shima Judo Club in Île-Perrot, is the new 2020 Canadian 'Elite 8' judo champion in the under 18 age group.

Held last weekend at the Pierre Charbonneau centre at the Olympic park in Montreal, the Elite 8 Championship is a tournament where only the eight topranked athletes (or judokas) in the country qualify to enter for each category. The rankings are a reflection of points earned at various other tournaments throughout the year. Also qualifying for the Elite 8 championship from the club were Alex Marineau and Ryan Proulx, both of whom unfortunately were prevented from competing due to injuries.

Brazeau has been practicing judo for about four and a half years with the club, and is part of the sport-études program at Chêne-Bleu secondary school in Pincourt, which allows her extra hours of training with coach Richard Proulx.

"She trains about 30 hours a week," said Proulx "and that's on top of studying for school, and she also works. That's a lot of dedication at age 16."

That dedication is paying off.

Brazeau dominated her way through six fights last Saturday to take the top spot in her category. There are different ways to win a judo match: on points at the end of the time limit, by pinning an opponent on their back for 20 seconds.

or by executing a controlled throw causing the opponent to land directly on their back on the mat, which ends the match immediately.

"Most of her matches were over in about 12 seconds," said Proulx, "I think the longest one was against a girl from Alberta that lasted about a minute and a half, but all the rest were over very fast."

With such an overwhelming performance at this year's Elite 8. Brazeau has the potential to see many more national or international victories in her future. Says Proulx, "She's a quiet girl, almost borderline shy, but when she goes on the mat, she's a real machine."

English anxiety management courses being offered by Le Versant

Spaces are still available for an English-language workshop being offered by Le Versant to help people living in the Vaudreuil-Soulanges region with anxiety issues deal with their condition.

Even though the first workshop officially began on Wednesday, January 15, Le Versant still has room to accommodate a few more English-speaking individuals who are interested in participating in the 12-week program.

"We've been doing this since 2008. Our workshops are mostly in French but we also offer an English program because of the high demand we've received from the population. The workshops are to help people with anxiety issues including social anxiety disorder," Marthe Bois from Le Versant told The Journal.

Most common mental health issue

Anxiety is one of the most common mental health problems that afflict people. The condition also imposes a major impact on the economy and causes school and workplace absenteeism. Physical symptoms related to anxiety issues also generate frequent visits

to the emergency room which adds a strain to the healthcare system and contributes to increased expenditures for health and social services.

Fortunately, there are numerous therapeutic approaches that can help relieve anxiety. The therapeutic model used by Le Versant is called Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) which is touted as one of most effective methods for helping to alleviate anxiety issues, said

Successful program

The workshops are led and monitored by former participants who have succeeded in managing their anxiety issues. "We provide peer help to our clients," said Bois. Each workshop session is two hours long for a total of 12

Most of the people who have participated in the previous workshops are happy with the results, said Bois. "During the first hour of each workshop, people express their feelings about how they deal with their anxiety. During the second hour, the monitors provide examples of various approaches they can take to alleviate their anxiety," said Bois.



A 12-week English workshop being held at the Vaudreuil-Dorion CLSC to address anxiety issues still has some available spots.

Mandatory first workshop

All participants are required to take the mandatory first workshop - The Global Approach: The Key to Master One's Anxiety Disorders - before registering for the other three subjects in the program. The weekly two-hour sessions will be held at the CLSC on Boulevard-de-la-Gare in Vaudreuil-Dorion. There is a \$40 fee for materials to participate in the program.

Boomers and Snowflakes



Near the tail end of 2019, "Okay, boomer" became the latest buzz phrase to sweep the internet, popularized by Millennials and Generation Z after it was used in response to a viral video of a man criticizing today's younger generations.

The phrase is used to mock or dismiss someone who is perceived as being narrow-minded or condescending, and it is generally employed against older people

or those whose views lean conservative.

This is just the newest meme that has stirred the pot of intergenerational tension. The common criticisms come up time and time again. Among other things, Baby Boomers are accused of outdated thinking and of being responsible for the current negative state of affairs, while Millennials and Gen Z are criticized over traits including laziness, entitlement, and holding an overly bleak view of the world.

Where does "okay, boomer" fit into this whole dialogue? For starters, the purpose of this phrase is to cut short a conversation. It signals that someone is finished listening and has decided to check out.

I know what it's like to have your experiences or worldview dismissed. I would bet that most of us do. It's frustrating. But we shouldn't turn away from the chance to exchange ideas and views altogether.

Reactions from some baby boomers have been wildly disproportionate, with at least one infamous response going as far as calling the phrase an ageist equivalent to "the n-word." Thankfully, it seems that only a small minority of all generations involved are taking it that seriously.

Whenever two people with different sets of experiences and opinions meet, there's bound to be tension at some point. Learning to engage with and listen to people with beliefs different from our own is a step in the right direction. It could help us find common ground and foster more cooperation between

"Okay, boomer" won't be what breaks the bonds between generations for good. It's hardly the first catchphrase used to play into negative stereotypes about an entire generation. It wasn't long ago that "snowflake" emerged as a popular buzzword for the negative characteristics attributed to millennials and teens.

There is a time and place for calling people out and telling them to check themselves when they are in the wrong. There is a time and place for poking fun at and expressing frustration over generational differences. There is even a time and place for ending conversations that may not be worth engaging in. But making trends out of belittling and invalidating entire generations isn't a path I'm comfortable taking, even - and especially – as a retaliatory response to similar treatment.

Every generation is defined by things both good and bad. Dismissing each other as soon as we run into roadblocks prevents us from learning what we can from each other's experiences, values, strengths, and weaknesses. And getting caught up in generational warfare over every new meme that comes along certainly doesn't help anyone.



Homemade falafel

If you're embracing the concept of 'Veganuary' - trying out a vegan diet for at least one month, this is a recipe that even carnivores will like.

Falafel is a stick-to-your-ribs dish that's low in fat and high in protein. And while there's some preparation involved, the actual cooking time is relatively quick.

The secret is to start with dried chickpeas - don't use canned. Your falafel will come out too mushy.

- 1 lb of dried chickpeas, soaked overnight and drained
- 1 diced medium onion
- ½ cup fresh parsley leaves
- 3 or 4 cloves of minced garlic
- 3 tbsp flour
- 2 tsp salt
- ½ tsp black pepper
- 1/4 tsp cayenne or chili
- 2 tsp baking powder (optional)
- 2 tsp cumin
- 1 tsp ground coriander

In a large food processor, pulse all ingredients. If your processor is smaller, divide ingredients and pulse in two batches. Don't overdo it - you don't want it too mushy. Aim for a texture similar to couscous.



Cover and refrigerate for at least an hour.

When chilled, roll mixture into golfball size shape. Be firm but don't compact the falafel too tightly.

Using a heavy pan or deep fryer, heat vegetable oil to 375° F.

Fry until golden brown, flipping to ensure even browning on all sides, around five minutes total cooking.

Serve with your choice of garnishes including lettuce, tomato, onion, cucumber, cilantro, tahini sauce, hummus,

You can also bake the falafel if you prefer in a 375° F oven - flatten them down slightly for even browning and crispiness on both sides.

The weekend Gardner

Gardening in the bleak midwinter

Though taken down now, I had a very garden-oriented Christmas tree this vear. Maybe all gardeners are like this. but my tree was full of birds, painted floral things, and old-fashioned 'fruit' decorations (I have a dozen amazingly realistic strawberries that I hang amid the glitter). Mind you, my Christmas tree always carries a lot of summer on its branches. It just feels necessary during those dark days of December.

But now that the days are getting longer (post Solstice), and we are at last in the same year as the coming spring, we can at least mentally putter around our garden again and start to plan.

When you look at what the gardening gurus are predicting for 2020, the trends are intriguing.

First, there is a most interesting new word for us: re-wilding.

Part of the enormous trend toward sustainability, the goal of a vast, beautifully manicured greener-than-green lawn is now old-fashioned, retro and just plain yuck. Instead we are urged to consider letting corners of our garden

grow the way it wants to. Re-wilding our garden spaces means to allow bushes and shrubs to be their own shape and permits a weed or two. Let some grass go to seed in the corner and we will be totally on-trend. Think wildflowers in a meadow and you have the picture.

Second, consider acquiring plants with dark foliage this year. Red, purple, or even almost-black leaves will be very in. I have no reasons to offer that substantiate this apparent trend - I simply read it in all the articles. But who doesn't like one of those delicious purple basil species, for example.

Third, there is strong trending toward having more edible things in the garden - and they don't mean for your deer, rabbits, or squirrels. The gurus are talking about planting people food amongst the blooms: carrots in the chrysanthemums, radishes among the roses. Fruit trees in the middle of daisy patches and salad and salvia, side-by-side. Even better would be double agent flowers that fulfill both these tasks - like nasturtiums which are not only beautiful flowers but are eatable (especially with some soft goat cheese in the middle of the floweret, tossed into a green salad).

Fourth, herbs are big big for 2020 and perfect for container gardening if you only have a small patch of land or a patio. My Christmas turkey was dressed this year in herbs I grew myself on my balcony, and then dried. I had sayory. thyme and rosemary mostly, with some oregano and basil thrown in for good measure.

Other 2020 trends include the current mania for houseplants lead by Millennials which has created its own further trend – the flourishing market for succulents of all kinds. Now in addition to plants like hen-and-chicks, gardeners are looking for lesser known species that offer interesting shapes, textures and growth habits.

As far as floral bouquets go, the big trend for 2020 is for fewer flowers

and more foliage. No longer all about blooms, the soft organic feel of greenery is increasingly sought after by decorators and gardeners alike.

And the big colour for 2020? It's purple, maybe with a little burgundy on the side. Or soft neutrals, all together, like eight shades of white growing in one garden, for example...or pastel variations of a single hue.

As for me, re-wilding and growing food among the flowers is where I'll direct my mental garden puttering during these bleak midwinter days of January. I'll take my cue from my Christmas tree with its strawberries, birds and flower decorations, and simply continue to do that mix-and-match thing.

All fashionable gardeners will be doing it this year, after all.
